Background Summary

- 1.2 billion people are living in poverty
- Poverty in rural poor have gone up

 Limited funds are available for creating sustainable livelihood structures to get the poor out of perpetual poverty.

 Much of the charity money or aid from USA, United Nations or foundations go to preventing, extreme hunger, diseases, calamities, or improving social and economic conditions to meet the Millennium Development Goals.

 Historically, due to lack of skills or seed investment capital, the extreme poor never got a chance to start on creating sustainable commerce or livelihood structures for themselves

 Today's economic system metrics are focused on improving "Top-down" economy only; leaving the poordependent on charity or government benefits.

 Chances of the bottom poor finding traditional jobs are very limited, so perpetual poverty continues.

So visited the extreme poor on "Ground Zero" for search of answers to eradicate perpetual poverty

Ground-Zero Realities

Approach: Visited UNDP project sites in India and in South Africa, and captured on-the-ground discussions (on video clips) with the local poor-----to find today's realities, gaps and potential bridges to plug these gaps.



Major Findings

- MDG work is great on providing infrastructure etc. but what is holding the poor back are simple bottlenecks-

-The poor need <u>free</u> business and technical support, and Seed money to get'em on their feet-

-Rural poor fully embrace self-sustaining green life style-



"The Gap"

"Except for humanitarian emergencies, direct cash transfers are rarely an attractive way to deliver official development assistance (ODA). Cash transfers can raise the poor above desperate income levels, but are not likely to unlock the poverty trap if they merely fill the consumption gap. To end the poverty trap, direct foreign assistance should be used for investments in infrastructure and human capital (trough public services in health, nutrition, and education), thereby empowering the poor to be more productive <u>on their own account</u>, and putting the poor countries on a path of self-sustaining growth—Jeffrey Sacks on Millineum Development Goals.

"There's component of individual responsibility in individual success, but society has a responsibility to give people the tools they need to succeed" "Government cannot solve all our problems, but what it should do is that which we cannot do for ourselves----protect us from harm, provide every child a decent education; keep our water clean and our toys safe; invest in new schools and new roads and new science and technology" – President Obama on "Role of Government"

Unfortunately, the poor don't have skills or capital to get on the first rung of the economic ladder on their own account.
